

Risk factors exist in multiple contexts


Risk factors are not causal



Community Laws and Norms Favorable Toward Drug Use






What Norms Are Displayed Here?








Low Neighborhood Attachment and Community Disorganization






School Domain Risk Factors

Academic Failure Beginning Late Elementary School

- Falling behind for any reason grades 4-6 or later
- Label of failure gets "stuck"
- Before grade 4, time to recover








Individual/Peer Domain Risk Factors

Early and Persistent Anti-social Behavior



Alienation and Rebelliousness




Gang Involvement

More likely to use alcohol and/or other drugs and to engage in delinquent or violent behavior if involved with gangs

Constitutional Factors






Just a Reminder...How We Prevent Substance Misuse
